- Rochester, NH
- Population ~31,000 (2008 Census estimate)
- Largest City in Strafford County (pop. 121,000)
- 60 Sworn Police Officers
- 2 patrol sectors
- 10 Detectives and a Detective Sergeant
  - 1 Detective assigned to DV investigations
- Accounts for over 1/3 of DV arrests in the County

- •All DV prosecution done by the DV Unit based at the Strafford County Attorney's Office.
  - Includes attorneys, victim assistance coordinators, legal assistants and an investigator.
- Member of the Strafford County DV Project
  - CCR also based at the County Attorney's Office.
  - In the planning process for our FJC

- Formal Lethality Assessment initiated by the DV Project and started in Rochester in 2005
- Modified version of Dr. Campbell's tool
- Mandatory in all DV arrests
- Intention was to share with prosecution, confidential advocacy, probation and BIP.

- The tool was used by law enforcement, sent to prosecution at the time of arrest.
- Due to a variety of factors use of the form ended and other tools were evaluated.

## Maryland LAP

- Started in October 2005 with:
  - 4 Law Enforcement Agencies
  - 2 Partner DV service providers
  - 4 Counties
- By March of 2009
  - 92 Law Enforcement Agencies
  - 20 Partner DV service providers
  - 24 Counties

## Maryland LAP

- Currently the program has spread to over:
  - 150 Law Enforcement Agencies
  - 49 Partner DV service providers
  - 61 Counties
  - 15 States

## Maryland LAP in NH

- In 2009, the NH Attorney General's Office began a pilot project in Merrimack County, NH using the Maryland Lethality Assessment Protocol.
- They had positive results and set a goal of instituting it statewide.
- Strafford County was chosen as the next venue for implementation.

# The Screen and Protocol

- Simple 11 question tool
- Developed, researched and implemented by the Maryland Network Against Domestic Violence
- Unique because of the accompanying response protocol.

**Note:** The questions above and the criteria for determining the level of risk a person faces is based on the best available research on factors associated with lethal violence by a current or former intimate partner. However, each situation may present unique factors that influence risk for lethal violence that are not captured by this screen. Although most victims who screen "positive" or "high danger" would not be expected to be killed, these victims face much higher risk than that of other victims of intimate partner violence.

- 2) Tell them your name, department and that it is a LAP call.
- 3) Give them your call back number.
- \*\*DO NOT USE VICTIM'S PHONE NUMBER AS CALL BACK NUMBER.\*\*
- 4) Give screening form to department LAP contact.

#### The Screen

- Yes to any of the first 3 questions indicates high danger and triggers the protocol referral
- No to the first 3 but yes to any 4 of the remaining questions triggers the protocol referral.
- First responders may trigger the protocol referral even if the victim doesn't screen in.

### **Protocol Referral**

- A victim that screens in is told:
  - She/he are in danger and
  - People in his/her situation have been killed.

### Protocol Referral

- The victim is then told that the first responder is going to contact an advocate.
- The victim is given the opportunity to speak with the advocate.
- The advocate will go over safety planning with the victim and give a brief summary of other assistance that they can provide.

### Protocol Referral

- If the victim declines speaking with an advocate then the Officer obtains safety planning advice and shares it with the victim.
- Calls last 10 minutes or less.
- Overall goal of the call is to get victims connected with confidential advocacy to prepare a safety plan.

#### Procedure

- Form is completed in:
  - All intimate partner DV arrests
  - When you believe the victim faces danger when you leave.
  - When the home or parties are repeat calls.
  - When your gut tells you the situation is dangerous.

## Implementation

- The existing strong CCR in Strafford County has aided in the implementation of the protocol.
- Rochester officers seemed more open to this concept because of the response protocol.

# Rochester LAP Statistics

- First screen administered in Rochester on February 28, 2010
- Between 2/28/10 and 5/22/10
  - 42 Screens attempted
  - 29 Screened in as high danger (69%)
    - 24 spoke with an advocate (82%)
  - 11 did not screen in as high danger (26%)
  - 2 did not respond to any of the screening questions (5%)

# Rochester LAP Statistics

- A Safe Place Statistics
  - 77 calls from 3/1/10 to 9/30/10
  - 48 of those victims requested additional services.

## Next Steps

- Continual re-evaluation of the program to study how we can improve.
- Working toward implementation at local hospitals.
- Screening victims that file for protective orders at the courts.




#### **Save The Date**

2011 International Family Justice Center Conference April 5-7 2011 in San Diego, CA


