


















#### Why Start with Trauma?

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#### Why Start with Trauma?

- •The Victim's First Impression matters...
- Understanding the impact of Victim Trauma promotes:
- o victim healing more reporting
- o better interviews & investigations
- o greater offender accountability = Public Safety
- Not understanding leads to bad outcomes and potentially long-term, devastating consequences for Victim and Community...

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#### Why Start with Trauma?

•Impacts of trauma are frequently misinterpreted as not telling the truth...

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"No obvious signs of injury..."

"Victim isn't acting the way I would expect..."

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#### **Understanding Trauma**

Trauma physically changes our brain...

- Trauma triggers chemicals...
- Chemicals influence perception, reaction, and memory...
- Memory becomes fragmented (out of sequence)
- Memory is stored in the brain differently
- We do not control how the brain and body responds to

#### **Understanding Trauma**

• Delayed reporting, inability to recall details and sequence of events is common as a result of victim trauma (fragmented memory) - Impacts of trauma can be life long.

#### **Defining Trauma**

A traumatic event either witnessed or experienced, representing a fundamental threat to one's physical integrity or survival

- •Responses involve intense fear, helplessness or horror
- •The meaning of the event may be as important as the actual physical act/experience




#### Strangulation A Quick Reference Guide


Strangulation is a form of asphyxia (lack of oxygen) characterized by closure of the blood vessels and or air passages of the neck.


- · Absence of visible injury is common
- Encourage medical treatment























#### Officer Trauma & Victim Trauma

#### Officer:

- · "I don't remember pulling my weapon"
- "I don't remember squeezing off the first 5-6 shots"
- "I had a vision of my
- wife at my funeral"

#### Victim / Survivor:

- · "Not exactly sure what happened"
- · "I don't really know how long it lasted"
- "I kinda just blanked out / I just went somewhere else"

#### How Victim Trauma Impacts Investigation

Victims may experience certain responses during and after the assault:

- Traumatic Memory is fragmented, can't provide narrative - misinterpreted as not being truthful
- Demeanor: lack of emotion or odd or inappropriate affect - misinterpreted
- There is no "normal victim response"

#### How Victim Trauma Impacts Investigation

Victims may experience certain responses during and after the assault:

- A range of emotions-fear, self blame, shame, etc...
- Impact from "disastrous disclosures" and victim blaming: Why did you...? Why didn't you...?

#### How Victim Trauma Impacts Investigation

The Victim is "sitting on the edge of their seat:"

"Am I going to be believed?"

"Am I going to be supported?"

#### Victim's First Impression Matters!

"The tone of the first meeting with the victim may set the tone for the rest of the investigation.

By being empathetic, patient, and respectful, (you) can contribute to the immediate and long term recovery of the victim and lay the foundation for mutual cooperation and respect on which a successful interview, investigation and prosecution is built."

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#### Reassure the Victim

 $\underline{Reassure}$  and  $\underline{empower}$  the victim with a consistent and supportive message:

Empower Victim - decisions to regain control

- "I'm sorry this happened... I commend you for reporting..."
- "Would you like to call someone for support?"
- "Where would you like to sit?" "Is it Ok if I sit here?"
- "Can I get you something...."

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#### Reassure the Victim

 $\frac{Reassure}{supportive} \ and \ \underline{empower} \ the \ victim \ with \ a \ \underline{consistent} \ and \ \underline{supportive} \ message:$ 

"Can I tell you something?"

- "Your health and safety is our priority"
- "We have a specially trained team..."
- "We will do our best to keep you informed
- Advocacy support

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#### Avoid "Victim Blaming"

Questions to avoid:

Why did you...?

Why didn't you...?

We do not need to answer these questions in the initial response. We can find another way to ask later in the investigation.

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#### Trauma Informed Victim Interviews

**Preliminary or initial interview** – brief interview to assist in continuing the investigation

**Follow-up or formal interview** – Following one, or preferably two sleep cycles; balancing the pace of the investigation with the victim's ability to move forward

#### Trauma Informed Interview

The interview is a way to allow the victim to express what their experience was rather than just what they remember or don't remember. Capturing the **trauma** and the **sensory and peripheral details** of the event is **compelling evidence**.

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#### Trauma Informed Interview

Disclosure is a process, not an event

•What are you able to tell us about your experience?

•"Paint a picture" of the experience...

- What did no look like?
- What did the absence of yes look like?
- What did fear feel like?

Interviewing for sensory and peripheral details

#### Look for for Interconnected & Co-Occurring Crimes – Serial Nature of Offenders

- Suspect's previous conduct with victim?
- o controlling, threatening, frightening behavior
- o abuse, harassment, stalking
- o physical assault, injury, previous strangulation
- · Suspect's conduct with other potential victims?

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#### Victim to Survivor: Advocacy Services

- A 2006 study found when victims receive advocate-assisted services they receive more helpful information and services and experience less secondary trauma by medical and legal systems (Better Services)
- When advocates are present in the legal and medical proceedings victims fare better in both the short- and longterm; less psychological distress, health problems, self-blame, guilt, and depression (Less Trauma)
- Rape survivors with advocates were 59% more likely to report to police (More Reporting) (Campbell, 2006)

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#### **Use of Expert Witnesses**

Impacts of trauma: delayed reporting, fragmented memory

- · Most victims do not physically resist;
  - Freeze
  - Tonic immobility
  - Submit Negotiate
  - Dissociation
- Prosecutors can use expert witnesses to explain trauma, minimization, strangulation, suspect power and control dynamics


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

In 2014 Tom assisted the National Center for Campus Public Safety with the White House Task Force recommendation to develop a new curriculum for Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations specific for Colleges and Universities across the country.

Tom holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice. He is a graduate of the 183<sup>rd</sup> Session of the FBI National Academy, the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar, the Police Executive Research Forum – Senior Management Institute for Police, and the National Law Enforcement Leadership Institute on Violence Against Women.
